Additional governance issues (Optional information)

Niokolo Network works in close partnership with a Senegalese Community Based Organisation called Kamben. This organisation is made up of an all-Senegalese committee & executive board with representatives from women's groups, local schools, the National Park Service, tourist guides and village chiefs.

Over the period of this annual report, Niokolo Network has also worked closely with Purple Field Productions, a registered UK charity that specialises in producing films to support community development in some of the poorest countries in the world.

Objectives and activities

Summary of the objects of the charity set out in its governing document

The object of the CIO is to promote sustainable development for the benefit of the public in economically disadvantaged communities on the periphery of Niokolo-Koba National Park, a UNESCO World Heritage Site in Danger located in southeastern Senegal.

- The relief of poverty and the improvement of the conditions of life;

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Background

Senegal ranks 62 out of 87 countries on the UN Development Programme's Human Development Index, making it by their definition a 'low development country' based on measures of income, life expectancy and education. Niokolo-Koba National Park is located in southeastern Senegal, and in this rural area human poverty and environmental degradation go hand in hand.

Niokolo-Koba National Park encompasses a massive 900,000ha of diverse habitat that supports many endangered animal species including some of the last remaining populations of West African lions, wild dogs and chimpanzees. It also plays a central role in climate, soil and water regulation, and provides natural resources which local people living around the park rely on for cooking and building as well as for food for themselves and for their livestock. But current levels of resource exploitation are not sustainable and in 2007 the park was placed on the UNESCO list of World Heritage Sites in Danger. Reduction in the availability of natural resources coupled with climate change and soil degradation pose a major threat to food security and living conditions in communities which are dependent on subsistence agriculture and livestock and already struggling with high levels of poverty.

Government bodies and INGOs have delivered a number of projects to address the interrelated development and environmental issues in the Niokolo region, but a lack of ownership from local communities has made it difficult to achieve sustained impacts. With this project, Niokolo Network aimed to build the capacity of a Senegalese community group called Kamben to produce local language educational films as a way of giving local people a voice to identify the key issues they face and to develop sustainable community-led solutions.

Project activities 2017

Working together with the UK charity Purple Field Productions, a UK film professional was selected to deliver training in pre- and post-production film techniques to Kamben Film Group in rural Senegal. The training was delivered everyday over a 3-week period in February and March 2017.

The training incorporated:

- The provision of a basic film equipment kit including a semi-professional film camera, a professional pivot-head tripod, a reflector, a Zoom-H4 audio recorder, audio cables, a boom pole, microphone with windshield, and kit to clean and maintain equipment.
- Demonstration and practice of how to take care of the equipment and store it
- Revision of pre-production techniques including researching ideas, storyboarding, identifying locations, selecting actors and thinking about props.
- Training in camera techniques with the new camera and reflector including using the zoom, iris, focus and gain, use of the reflector to improve light conditions and vertical and horizontal panning. Revision of different types of shot including close-ups, midshots and long shots, and applying these in filming people and landscapes, carrying out interviews and pop vox. Filming using the tripod and mobile on-the-shoulder technique were both practiced.
- Extended understanding of how to record good quality spoken voice and soundscapes using both a directional microphone and stereo mikes. This included an introduction to the Zoom-H4 a digital sound recorder, placement of microphones including placement of the boom pole, and explanation of sound levels.
- Learning effective methods of communication between all members of the film crew e.g. director, sound person, cameraperson, and boom and reflector operators. How to begin filming using a clapperboard, and taking notes to aid the editor.

- Teaching 2 members of the group the basics of uploading film and audio files into a computer, editing material and exporting a finished film.
 - Application of all skills in the planning and production of a 20-minute film.

2017 achievements

- Kamber, Film Group was established with seven members and an associate member working for the National Park Service. Members of the group now have the equipment and skills to plan and film educational documentaries and dramas to a semiprofessional standard.
- Creation of a short film introducing the film group during a training exercise, this is to be improved on by the group and used to publicise their work to other organisations.
- A 20 minute film on 'l'etat civil' was produced on the issue of many people not being registered and/or having their identity documents.
- Increase in interest within the broader village community in the use of film to raise awareness of local issues and potential solutions. Other people have expressed an interest in being involved in future work and members of the association Kamben have agreed that Kamben film group should play a central role in future projects.

At the current time Niokolo Network is a newly established charity with a very small annual income. We do not have any governance costs and it is the decision of the charity's trustees that no commitments to support charitable activities should be made until the necessary funds have been secured.
